Here are a few tips for participating:

- 1. Put it in writing. You will get the best response if you put your questions or opinions in writing prior to the meeting. It helps you and the board. Some issues may require a little research by the manager. Also, the board can serve you better as members have time to consider your concern.
- 2. Call ahead. As a courtesy, the association asks that you phone and let the manager know that you wish to address the board. This also allows us to notify you if a meeting is cancelled for any reason.
- 3. Plan your remarks to last no longer than three minutes. Board members enjoy visiting with residents; however, the meeting agenda is always very full, and the three-minute limit ensures that all business gets conducted. This doesn't

Trash Can Reminder




*Due to the high amount of trash can violations that occurred during our last inspection, please read and adhere to the timeline below.

ACC Rule 6.4: Trash containers may be placed on the street after 5:00 P.M. the day before trash pickup. Containers need to be removed from the street no later than 9:00 A.M. the following day. All trash/garbage containers must be screened from street view on days other than trash pickup.

Bark Beetle Forecast for Southern California 2019 BE ON THE LOOKOUT!

As I'm sure most of you are aware, our geographical location is surrounded by various forests such as the Cleveland and San Bernardino National Forest. All of these forests are in fact experiencing the repercussions of Bark Beetle infestations. A Bark Beetle is a small wood-boring beetle that tunnels under the bark of trees, which die if heavily infested. Normally these beetles will inhabit dead trees, however, they can infest trees that are weakened because of the lack of water they receive.

California's fire season activity for this year is predicted to be above normal. If you have a dead or dying tree, please look for the signs of a bark beetle infestation. If you determine that your tree is infested, then please cut down the tree and haul it away ASAP.



These are the signs to look out for:



- White or reddish-brown or orange sap-like substance on the outside of the bark.
- If the Pitch tube is reddish brown or even orange-yellow, most likely the beetle was successful in attacking the tree.

Types of trees that Bark Beetles attack:

cedar, fir, pine, spruce trees.

Less Common Trees:

arborvitae, cypress, elm, fruit, larch and redwood

- The needles on pines, begin to turn a reddish-brown color. Often the change begins at the top of the trees and moves down.
 - A white pitch tube means the beetle was successfully repelled by the tree.

Container Planting Tips

- 1. Consider growing dwarf varieties, they are almost always perfectly happy in containers.
- 2. Garlic, leeks and shallots make great container gardening plants. They have very few insect and disease problems, have shallow roots and take up very little space.
- 3. Plants should be sized to the container and containers should be sized to the area.
- **4.** Use light-colored containers, this reduces heat absorption and helps keep roots cool.
- 5. Seed saving is fairly easy to do and it's a great way to stretch your gardening budget!
- 6. Plan ahead when planting a tree in a pot. Think how big it will grow in several years and if the container you chose is big enough to support it.
- 7. Mix slow-release organic fertilizers with your potting mix to keep plants growing and blooming all season long.
- 8. Early morning and right around sunset are the best times to water, it decreases water loss through evaporation.
- grow. It's perfect for covering ordinary walls.
- 10. When selecting a planter, remember anything that holds soil and drains can be used. Be creative! 2. Remove spent flowers (deadhead) on annuals, roses
- 11. If you have large heavy pots, place them on a small platform with wheels. They will be much easier to move throughout the season.
- 12. Select a simple pot to showcase an exotic looking plant or a flashy pot to make an ordinary plant stand out.
- 13. Remember that nutrients are leeched out of the soil every time you water - watch closely for any sign of deficiencies.
- 14. If containers rest on the ground without saucers they won't drain as well - consider placing the pots on a bench or just resting on a few bricks.
- 15. When planting containers, fill them with soil to within one inch of the top to allow room for watering.
- **16.** Harvest your container vegetables often; it encourages the plant to produce more of them.

Fall Reminders

- 1. Pull weeds as soon as you notice them, before they go 9. Ivy is a great container plant as it's very easy to to seed in the garden. This will help reduce overwintering weeds that can wreak havoc next year.
 - and perennials. Many will reward you with more blooms that continue well into fall.
 - 3. Prune and remove dead branches on shrubs and small trees.
 - 4. **Keep new plantings** (planted within the past six months) of flowers, shrubs and trees watered during hot, dry spells.
 - 5. Order spring flowering bulbs like daffodils and tulips. Most companies will ship them to you at the appropriate time in the fall. The soil temperature should be 60 F or cooler before you plant.
 - 6. Start seeds for fall crops including spinach, lettuce and greens. Many of these will grow well into winter and tolerate light frost.


September Family Campout - Cancelled

Baked Steak Soup

3 lbs. Stew meat

3 large Carrots, peeled

8 oz. Mushrooms, sliced

2 large Potatoes, peeled and cut into 1inch cubes

1 yellow Onion, diced

28 oz. can Tomatoes, crushed in juice

10½ oz. can Beef Consume

1/4 cup dry white wine, or water

4 Tbsp. Tapioca

1 Tbsp. Brown Sugar

½ cup breadcrumbs or Panko

1 Bay leaf

Salt and Pepper to taste



I like to add 1 cup of frozen peas towards the end of cooking. Mix, Cover and place in oven, bake at 300 degrees for 4 hours.

Wonderful Baked Eggs

6 eggs, beaten well

½ cup whole milk


½ tsp. dry mustard

1/4 cup sliced green onion tops

1 cup chopped ham

1 cup shredded cheddar cheese

Salt and pepper



Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a 7×9 inch baking dish. (or 8 inch pie dish). Combine eggs, milk and dry mustard and beat well. Pour into prepared dish. Sprinkle onion, ham and cheese evenly over top of eggs and bake for 25/30 min or until puffed and a knife inserted in the center comes out clean.

Makes about 4 to 6 servings.



BLOCK CAPTAINS NEEDED!

Did you know: In 95% of all emergencies, the victim or bystander provides the first immediate assistance on the scene? Would you know what to do? After taking a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) training, you would!

At The Farm, we have set up a GREAT Emergency Response plan! But, we need Block Captains to make this plan work. In short, we need YOU! What does that entail? I'm glad you asked!

A Block Captain is required to take a CERT class and First Aid class. CERT training is a 20 hour course offered by most cities over a weekend (Friday night-4 hours, Saturday and Sunday-8 hours each). Most CERT classes are FREE! They are informative and fun. There are hands-on exercises as you learn about disaster preparedness and response skills such as basic First Aid, light Search & Rescue, Triage, Fire Suppression and Team Organization. Note: Even if you have physical limitations, you can take CERT training. They also offer Teen CERT classes for those under 18 years of age (plus they get 20 school community service hours!)

You decide how many homes in your neighborhood you want in your "Block". Meet with your neighbors and give them Emergency Preparedness hand-outs so that they know how to accumulate the appropriate Emergency supplies for their family's safety and well-being.

If a major disaster happens, each household in your Block will report to you as to their situation. If major help is needed, you report to your Zone Commander, who in turn contacts Incident Command and help is dispatched (all by HAM or "Family" Radios). Each household will be receiving Red and Green ribbon/flags to tie to their light pole indicating that they are okay (Green) or in need of help (Red). (I keep mine thumbtacked to the wall inside my entry-way closet.)

EFFECTIVE OCTOBER 1, 2019

New Weekly Collection Services of Waste, Recycling and Green Waste Carts:

- Trash Cart collection services will be provided on weekly basis
- Recycling Cart collection services will be provided on a weekly basis (no longer bi-weekly)
- **Green Waste Carts** Delivery of green waste carts will take place throughout the month of September and the service will start in the month of October. Please ONLY place grass, leaves, and plant clippings in the green waste cart (No Trash).

New Rates for New Service:

- Regular Services 1- 96-gallon Trash Cart, 1-96-gallon Recycling Cart & 1-96 gallon Green Waste Cart for \$28.09 Per Month
- Senior Citizen Rate: 1-65-gallon Trash Cart, 1-65-gallon Recycling Cart & 1-65 gallon Green Waste Cart for \$24.85 Per Month
- Hard to Service Areas: \$34.40 Per Month

Additional Services Provided:

• Residential Bulky Item Pick Up: "2 Free" Per Year

Residents with curbside cart service may request two times in a calendar year, the free pick up of household bulky items and extra green waste. Please contact Waste Management customer service (800) 423-9986 at least 24 hours in advance of your regular collection date to schedule. Bulky items include: couches, washers, dryers and refrigerators. Bulky items do not include large items such as car bodies or construction and demolition waste, hazardous waste or any other items that cannot be handled by one person.

Disposal of Used Motor Oil

Waste Management offers free pickup of residentially generated used motor oil (a maximum of two gallons per week are accepted). Please contact Waste Management customer service (800) 423-9986 at least 24 hours in advance of your regular collection date to schedule.

Christmas Tree Recycling

Waste Management will collect and recycle Christmas trees for the first two weeks following Christmas at no additional charge.

• Residential Community Cleanups- Scheduled two times a year

A postcard will be mailed to all residential household informing them of their scheduled residential community cleanup at least two weeks before the cleanup event.

811 BELOW YOUR FEET By George W. Taylor

This article is prompted by both past and recent events and is published for your consideration. First the past, as I recall hearing sirens coming from the Millpond area of The Farm. In this instance the story that unfolded was represented by one of our residents excavating for unknown purposes on his/her property. What I do know is that apparently this person ruptured a gas line, and as a result there were some evacuations that took place. The gas line was quickly repaired and I understand there were no injuries that followed.

The most recent event, as I am sure that most all know about happened in Murrieta, where a gas line was ruptured during a solar installation. The result this time was more severe and ended with a whole home destroyed and with the death of one of the workers. In both instances no action was taken to call 811 "Dig Alert" before ground penetration took place.

For your information, in The Farm, we have a 10 foot wide Utility Easement that crosses the front of all of our residential properties. These Utility Easements are a part of the City Roadways in The Farm. Buried in these easements is the electrical, water, some telephone feeds including fiber, that powers our homes.

Bottom line is, that for your safety, Before you dig anywhere within this 10 foot easement or elsewhere on your property, especially if you are planting trees or digging for a foundation, that you place a call to 811 "Dig Alert" and complete the Dig Alert application.

IT IS A FREE SERVICE , AND IT IS THE THING YOU NEED TO DO.

mean big issues can't be presented. If your concern requires more time, please summarize it in three minutes, and the board will add it to the agenda for the next meeting.

- 4. Don't expect an immediate response. Board members don't act independently. All issues require discussion and sometimes a vote. Sometimes an immediate answer is possible, but it's just as likely that you won't get a response until after the meeting.
- 5. If you need information, call the manager at 951-244-3719. The purpose of the Homeowner Forum is for residents to share opinions and concerns with the board. Residents seeking general information (like a status report on a project or the board's position on an issue) can get a more immediate answer from the manager.
