#### **Community Garden**

Beth Kramer reported for Alan Sargent. There was no meeting last month. Meetings are held every other month. We will be meeting next Monday to discuss the Open House Barbecue, Eagle Scout project, and the Chili Cook-off.

# **Crime Watch Committee**

Beth Kramer reported for Crime Watch. Good evening! So, Crime Watch has a fixed car. Thank you to the Board for the car repairs. Due to the repair down-time and the parking lot repairs, I'm saddened to say we only were able to get 10 patrols in the month for a total of 38 volunteer hours. Those volunteers drove a total of 193 miles. With service mileage, a total of 221 miles were put on the car.

July was smog and tags and our expenses for the month were reviewed at our last meeting. Twenty-four police reports were filed in our neighborhood between 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. Reported was one hit and run, narcotics, unlawful

entry, several thefts, public disturbance, suspicious people, and suspicious vehicles. We reviewed the artwork for the committee insignia and discussed some of the limitations to keep the costs down.

At our next meeting, we will be discussing the Chili Cook-Off, membership drives, guest speakers, and finalizing the insignia artwork. As of this week, we are down to eight drivers with resignations of several more pending. We are in dire need of drivers, observers, and a secretary. All we ask for is a few hours a month. Our next meeting is Monday, September 23<sup>rd</sup> at 7 p.m. at Millers' Mill. If you can't make it to the meetings, please don't let that discourage you from volunteering. We want to encourage everyone if you are a victim or a witness to a crime to please call the appropriate police number, and Facebook only after the authorities.

#### **FERT Committee**

Katy reported for the FERT Committee. The Farm Emergency Response Team (FERT) reports the following: one change in administration, Jason Ritter has taken over for Search and Rescue. We are now back at 100%. On September 10, 2019, a 3.9 earthquake hit locally. There was no damage or requests for FERT assistance reported. The FERT team is still assembling and distributing the ribbon emergency tapes to the community with approximately two-thirds of the community delivered so far. Our next blood drive is Saturday, November 9<sup>th</sup> from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. There will be a barbecue, food served and a health fair. The FERT team will have a booth at the Chili Cook-Off on Saturday, October 19<sup>th</sup>. We will have a display set up and emergency buckets for sale. Our next drill in the community will be Wednesday, September 18<sup>th</sup> from 5:30 p.m. to finish. This is a fire drill. Saturday, October 5<sup>th</sup> is the Community Garage Sale and FERT will be selling muffins and coffee as a fundraiser. We had a detour through The Farm today (9.12.19) with lots of residents thanking the volunteers. Thank you, Paul, Cathy, Judy Dave, and Dean.

# EARTHQUAKE PREPAREDNESS

By Your Farm Emergency Response Team (FERT)

If a large earthquake hit The Farm, would you know what to do? Would you be prepared by having the supplies needed for your family? Let us help you get there! Also, FERT is looking for Block Captains so each of our neighborhoods has representation in case of a major event. Right now only 22% of Farm residents have Block Captains, so when we come around, please be open to discussing The Farm's Emergency Plans and we'll give you more information to help you get prepared.

Tips from the American Red Cross: (See opposite page for "21 Weeks to Prepare")

- Practice DROP, COVER and HOLD ON with all members of your household.
- Doorways are NO stronger than any other part of a structure. During an earthquake, get under a sturdy piece of furniture and hold on. (Also provides breathing space).
- Don't move about...most injuries are caused by people running into things and/or falling.
- Stay indoors until the shaking stops. Use stairs not elevators.
- Have a pair of sturdy shoes and flashlight by your bed. (Bare feet and broken glass...not a pretty picture.)
  What do you need in a Survival Kit?
- Water: one gallon per person, per day (3-day supply for evacuation, 2 week supply for home) (You can also buy a Life-Straw for about \$17...it filters 250 gallons of bad water.)
- Food: non-perishable, easy-to-prepare items (3-day supply for evacuation, 2 week supply for home) (You can also buy a 30 day supply of MRE-type...lasts 25 years...about \$100)
- Flashlight and batteries (do not store in the flashlight, as batteries tend to leak) (4-pack LED lanterns about \$25)
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (about \$17-\$20)
- Extra batteries (for flashlight, two-way radios, lanterns)
- Family First Aid Kit (copy of medication list, spare pair of glasses)
  - Medications (minimum 7-day supply)
- Multi-purpose tool, Whistle, Matches, Work gloves, Duct tape, Scissors, Liquid bleach
- Sanitation and personal hygiene items (and change of clothes)
- Copies of personal documents (proof of address, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies, deed to home)
- Cell phone chargers (solar is a great idea...about \$20)
  - Family and emergency contact information
  - Extra cash (in small bills)
  - Emergency blanket
  - Manual can opener
- Two-way radios and batteries (so you and your spouse can communicate)
- A 5-gallon bucket, trash bag, kitty litter and pool noodle make a great makeshift toilet

- Paper Map of the area (cell phones may not work)
  - For Kids: Games, books and toys
  - For Pets: Food, bowl, carrier, collar, leash, ID
- 3-day go-bags (backpacks) for each family member and one for pets.
- 2-week survival kit (rolling trash can or large, rolling luggage)

# **Frost Resistant plants**

Winter is coming and that means winter gardening. Here in the farm we are lucky in that we have a very small frost window. We can expect frost anytime around mid December through mid March. Frost resistant plants tend to love our lighter frost season and here are a few suggestions of frost resistant vegetable for your winter garden.

Beets
Sprouts
Cauliflower
Garlic
Mustard
Spinach



Broccoli Cabbage Chard Kale Onion Turnips



Brussels Carrots Collards Lettuce Parsley

There are four main types of plants you can plant in your fall garden; root crops, leafy greens, brassicas (or cole crops), alliums (onion family), and some herbs. All of these will winter well in a local garden and you won't have to worry about covering them with frost protection very often if at all.

Root crops that do well are carrots, beets, and radishes. Leafy greens that do well are kale, swiss chard, lettuces, spinach, arugula, greens (like turnip and mustard). Like the root crops, some of these will get sweeter (or less bitter) as the temperatures drop. Brassicas (or cole crops) that do well are, Chinese cabbage, broccoli, and cauliflower. For these crops, plant transplants and sow seeds as a way of succession planting so there isn't 20 heads of cabbage ready at the same time.

You can pretty much start any alliums in the fall garden. Garlic and storage onions can be planted in November. Once they sprout you can mulch them with a bit of straw to keep the weeds down. Repeater (or green) onions, Egyptian walking onions, perennial onions, and chives can all be planted in the fall garden.



- Do not answer personal questions about your home such as type of alarm, daytime occupancy, etc.
- Do not let people inside your home (to use the bathroom, phone, etc.).
- Avoid mail theft by obtaining a locked mailbox and dropping off outgoing mail at the local post office.

You must fill out an Architectural Change Application; this application can be picked up at The Farm office. # **Attention Residents:**

January 2019, the Architectural Control Committee started conducting ACC rule compliance inspections on a **quarterly basis** in January, April, July and October as opposed to our previous schedule that was performed on a triannual basis. In January and October, we check on pole lights at night; in April, the focus is on major painting issues. The **Quarterly Evaluation Process** is as follows:

- 1)The owners of any properties found to be in noncompliance will receive a courtesy letter with a 2-week deadline.
- 2) The owners of the properties that are still in noncompliance after being checked following the deadline will receive a Notice of Hearing with the Board of Directors with a 10-day deadline.
- 3) If the owners of the properties are still in non-compliance after being checked a third time, the Board may consider assessing a fine. At this point, a letter notifying the owner of the fine is mailed out.

During each evaluation, we always see a very high percentage of properties that observe the ACC Rules and the ACC members appreciate the residents time and toil to achieve a clean and tidy house and yard appearance which is great for the neighborhood and property values. Please be aware that all ACC members, FPOA Board members and all members on other committees abide by the same ACC rules as you and are expected to follow and have a duty to lead by example.

The Architectural Control Committee consists of a great group of your neighbors who volunteer countless hours of their time. It is the ACC's goal to adhere to a standard, be impartial, show consistency, dedication and dependability. I'm sure you'll agree that the aesthetics of The Farm properties have improved over the past few years. Granted, there are some properties due to vacancies and extenuating circumstances that remain a problem; the ACC is working on those within the parameters of our governing documents and

# STREET PARKING

No person shall park or leave standing any vehicle or trailer, on any city street, for a period in excess of three days. Also, a vehicle or trailer parked or left standing at the same location for more than 72 hours is prohibited to be parked or left standing at another location within a radius of 500 feet from the original location.

# **POLE LIGHTS**

Sunday, November 3<sup>rd</sup>, is Daylight Savings Time.

Dusk comes earlier in the evening now which
means it's a great time to check your pole lights.

Each owner is responsible for installing and
maintaining a pole light. Light bulbs must be white
and 40 to 75 watts. Placement of the pole light is
within six (6) feet of the street easement and
positioned on the property to shed light toward the
street and must be on from dusk to dawn.
