Any architectural changes or improvements to the exterior of your property require approval from the ACC Committee before work can be initiated. All ACC change applications must be submitted to The Farm Barn by Thursday, October 27th.

# 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter Evaluation Reminder:

October brings the beginning of the 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter ACC Evaluation. Two-week courtesy letters will be mailed to the properties needing weed abatement, exterior property repair, RV/trailer storage, trash cans, outside storage, and unscreened cooling devices. All trash/garbage containers must be screened from street view on days other than trash pick-up. Vegetation that is flammable and endangers the public safety by creating a fire hazard including but not limited to seasonal and recurrent weeds, stubble, brush, dry leaves, and tumbleweeds must be kept cleared. This includes pine needles.





## **EARTHQUAKE PREPAREDNESS**

If a large earthquake hit The Farm, would you know what to do? Would you be prepared by having the supplies needed for your family? Let us help you get there!

## **Tips from the American Red Cross:**

- Practice DROP, COVER, and HOLD ON with all members of your household.
- Doorways are NOT stronger than any other part of a structure. During an earthquake, get under a sturdy piece of furniture and hold on. (Also provides breathing space)
- Don't move about, most injuries are caused by people running into things and/or falling.
- Stay indoors until the shaking stops. Use stairs not elevators.
- Have a pair of sturdy shoes and flashlight by your bed. (Bare feet and broken glass...not a pretty picture!)

## What do you need in a Survival Kit?

- Water: One gallon per person, per day (3-day supply for evacuation, 2-week supply for home) (You can also buy a Life-Straw for about \$20. It filters 250 gallons of bad water.)
- Food: Non-perishable, easy-to-prepare items (3-day supply for evacuation, 2-week supply for home). You can also buy a 30-day supply of Meals-Ready-to-Eat (MRE) that lasts 25 years for about \$100.

Name

- Flashlight and batteries, but do not store them in the flashlight, as batteries tend to leak. (4-pack LED lanterns about \$30)
- Battery-powered or hand-crank radio (about \$25-\$35)
- Extra batteries (for flashlight, two-way radios, lanterns)
- Family First Aid Kit including a copy of medication list, spare pair of glasses, medications. Minimum 7-day supply.
- Multi-purpose tool, whistle, matches, work gloves, Duct tape, scissors, liquid bleach
- Sanitation, personal hygiene items, and change of clothes
- Copies of personal documents (proof of address, passports, birth certificates, insurance policies, deed to home)
- Solar cell phone chargers (about \$20)
- Family and emergency contact information
- Extra cash (in small bills)
- Emergency blanket
- Manual can opener
- Two-way radios and batteries (so you and your spouse can communicate)
- A 5-gallon bucket, black trash bag, kitty litter, and pool noodle make a great makeshift toilet
- Paper Map of the area (cell phones may not work)
- For Kids: Games, books, and toys
- For Pets: Food, bowl, carrier, collar, leash, ID, photos
- 3-day go-bags (backpacks) for each family member and one for pets.
- 2-week survival kit (rolling trash can or large, rolling luggage) (All above prices from Amazon.)

The generator can be activated at Millers' Mill to use as a cooling station in an extreme power outage. Contact a FERT member for more information or assistance in putting together your survival kit.

## **HOW-TO: IDENTIFY AND TREAT BURNS**

As we enter the holiday season this year, a lot of us are looking forward to family gatherings, fun activities, and lots of mouth-watering food! Some of us may be trying out a turkey fryer for the first time, while most of us are likely to stick to our traditional roasted bird. We must keep in mind that when any fryer/fire/stove/oven is added to the event list, it is important to remember fire safety and inform everyone (especially when there's younglings afoot) when you're walking with hot items. A few choice phrases can be used to notify others: "Hot stuff coming through!" or "Coming in hot!". One should also be aware of how to handle the more-common-than-not injury associated with fire: Burns.

There are four different degrees that burns can present as: -A 1st degree burn presents as a redness of the skin, typically without any blisters; -2nd degree burns present with blisters and redness; -3rd degree burns are major burns that can leave behind charred or white & leathery skin, these types of burns damage all the layers of the skin; -the 4th and most serious burn presents similar to the 3rd degree but has done serious damage to deeper than skin structures such as tendons, joints, and even bone.

Burns can be scary, especially when they increase in severity. It's important to remember these few steps for treating a burn to prevent further damage to the afflicted skin.

A major burn is often identified as covering the face, feet, groin, buttocks, or a major joint; sometimes it can encircle an arm or leg. The skin may appear charred and often the area begins to swell very quickly. These burns are deep and typically larger than 3 inches (8 cm) in diameter. When coming across a major burn, one must seek immediate medical care. If you are assisting someone that has been seriously burned, your job is to protect that person from further harm until medical help has arrived. Make sure the person is breathing, but do not try to remove any clothing that is stuck onto their body. Remove tight items like jewelry and belts before swelling in the area cuts off circulation to the appendage. Raise the burned area above the heart level if possible, cover the burn loosely with gauze or a clean cloth, and watch for signs of shock: cool, clammy skin, weak pulse, and shallow breathing. If it is an electrical burn, typically you can see an outlet that is fried nearby, a dangling power line, or a puddle of water next to a power source, do NOT approach the victim. First, call 911. Second, turn off the power source if possible, and under no circumstances approach a victim that is in a puddle of water without explicit instructions from medical personnel. Water can carry an electrical current and can use either the water itself or the body you are reaching for as a conduit to electrocute you. If there is no water present and the power source has been turned off, do NOT move the victim unless they are at risk of further danger. The 911 dispatcher may instruct you further on what steps to take.

A minor burn is a lot easier to take care of and doesn't typically require medical attention beyond first aid (2nd degree burns are advised to be examined after first aid has been administered). To treat a minor burn: - Remove

any jewelry or tight items that might restrict blood flow when swelling occurs; -Cool it down! Hold afflicted area under cool running water for approximately 10 minutes; -Don't break any blisters that form; -Apply lotion after the burn is cooled; -Bandage the burn loosely with sterile gauze/dressing; and -Take pain reliever if necessary. A lot simpler than a major burn for sure!

# BEAUTIFUL, AFFORDABLE, AND WATER-SAVING PLANTS

This month I'd like to talk about the California Fuchsia!

These flowers have lots of bright orange/red blooms. Their foliage will contrast with most plants since it is light green. The California Fuchsia is water-saving! It only needs heavy watering about once a month. If there is a heat wave though, try to spritz once a day if you can.

You'll like this: You can trim this plant with the lawn mower! (Down to 4 inches.) Only do this two times a year at most, but not in the summer since that is the blooming season. This method is possible because the plant bunches together like grass.

A couple local sources to find the California Fuchsia are Louie's Nursery and Tree of Life Nursery.
