FERT Committee

Dave Kentish reported for the FERT Committee. The blood drive will be held on Saturday, September 15th at the Farm Barn library. Sixteen-year-olds are okay.

Since the Farm Emergency Response Team inception August of 2017, we report the following to the Board; in the combined areas of operations, logistics, planning and administrative the following are approximate numbers to date with focus on the following critical areas: Administrative Team Leadership, currently operating at 100% (no change); Block Captains, currently operating at approximately 20% (up from 10%); Medical Supplies, currently operating at approximately 4% (no change); Search and Rescue equipment at approximately 5% (no change); Security equipment at approximately 5% (no change); Food Storage at approximately 5% (up from 3%) with food donating to Food Drive in December.

The FERT Operations Building is fully operational with the new generator in place. Communications are running at 95% (no change). These numbers are based on approximate residents of the community, and the number of residents not prepared, based on the surveys taken from all our recruiting events; approximately 3,000 residents with one-third needing some form of assistance.

To date, we currently have in reserve approximately \$980 after expenses for supplies. These funds come from donations, emergency bucket sales, and a Go Fund Me account. These funds were allocated to the above sections in need for basic emergency supplies to be stored within the Farm Community, specifically for the FERT team.

Our next scheduled drill for block captains is September 19th from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. at the EOC. The focus is the set-up of the EOC and training of block captains.



COOK'S CORNER





Easy Pumpkin Gingerbread

Turn oven to 325 F. Mist a loaf pan with cooking spray & flour lightly 1 pkg. (14.5 oz.) Gingerbread mix 1 cup Pumpkin puree (½ of a 15 oz. can) 2 large eggs ¼ cup warm water

1/2 cup golden raisins

Place all ingredients except raisins, in a large mixing bowl and beat with an electric mixer on low speed for 30 seconds. Stop and scrape down bowl, increase mixer speed to medium and beat 1 minute longer. The batter should be well combined, fold in raisins. Pour batter into prepared loaf pan.
Bake until it springs back when lightly pressed with a finger, 45 to 47 minutes.
Cool 15 minutes. Run a knife around the edges of the pan and remove it.
Place the loaf on its side on the rack and cool completely.

Bark Beetle Forecast for Southern California 2018 BE ON THE LOOKOUT!

As I'm sure most of you are aware, our geographical location is surrounded by various forests such as the Cleveland and San Bernardino National Forest. All of these forests are in fact experiencing the repercussions of Bark Beetle infestations. A Bark Beetle is a small wood-boring beetle that tunnels under the bark of trees, which die if heavily infested. Normally these beetles will inhabit dead trees,

however, they can infest trees that are weakened because of the lack of water they receive. This year, The Farm's Architectural Control Administrator has received numerous reports regarding the death of trees caused by bark beetles here in The Farm. If you have a dead or dying tree, please look for the signs of a bark beetle infestation. If you determine that your tree is infested, then please



 White or reddish-brown or orange sap-like substance on the outside of the bark.

 If the Pitch tube is reddish brown or even orange-yellow, most likely the beetle was successful in attacking the tree.

cut down the tree and haul it away ASAP. These are the signs to look out for:



<u>Types of trees that Bark</u> <u>Beetles attack:</u> cedar, fir, pine, spruce trees.

Less Common Trees:

arborvitae, cypress, elm, fruit, larch and redwood trees.

- The needles on pines, begin to turn a reddish-brown color. Often the change begins at the top of the trees and moves down.
 - A white pitch tube means the beetle was successfully repelled by the tree.

GAZETTE ARTICLE #9 CONTINUED

Following the demise of the Farm Development Company's Maintenance effort earlier in the year, August came around, and the FPOA formed its own maintenance crew to do the work. The Association bought a ride-around lawn mower, a chipper, a light weight truck and a Kubota Tractor to work in the groves. This was a first step in getting the Association in full control of the development.

During the previous seven years, the Board had accumulated close to \$60,000.00 in the reserve account and the Board committed to spending it on the rehab of the two pools of the time, the lake area, the water wheel and shuffle board courts, however the CPO continued to be dissatisfied.

On the 4th of May, 1985, the Eighth (8) Annual Meeting was held at The Farm Barn with the usual decorum. The first order of business was to introduce the newly hired Attorney, Elliot Luchs followed by thanking the Election Committee for their outstanding job. Someone had called the fire department complaining that there were too many people in the Farm Barn. After the fire department found no violation the meeting continued with the introduction of candidates (5). The quorum was 400 at that time. [Reason for five, being that three were term ending replacements, and two were ratification of two former members who stepped up to replace two others that had not completed their terms, but who recently had resigned.]

In this year, they not only had a Nominating Committee that spent at least an hour interviewing each candidate in addition to the Election Committee but also a Proxy Committee. Incidentally, one of the reasons for some resignations was that two Board members wanted to personally interview these three applicants again. This was for election in 1986, so when they didn't get their way they resigned.

In my opinion, an unfounded cause for a resignation over such an issue. Again, the electorate was asked if they would accept the annual assessment of \$16.20

In September, the Board felt that our governing documents needed to be reviewed to more favorably represent a planned development such as The Farm. A resident wrote a letter back saying that she would like to volunteer to review the FPOA CC&Rs, and she agreed to be the chairperson of such a committee. The subject was an item on the Board agenda and approved, however, she never was heard from with any input, and the Board took action to appoint a new chairperson to continue with an effort to do both the By Laws and the CC&Rs. "Enufff", so much for the conclusion of 1985. More next month.

CONSTITUTION CORNER

Daniel Webster during the early years of our country under the U.S. Constitution said, "Hold on, my friends, to the Constitution and to the Republic for which it stands. Miracles do not cluster, and what has happened once in 6,000 years, may not happen again. Hold on to the Constitution, because if the American Constitution should fail, there will be anarchy throughout the world."

In Congress, July 4, 1776 - The unanimous Declaration of the thirteen united States of America. When in the course of human events, it becomes necessary for one people to dissolve the political bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the powers of the earth, the separate and equal station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent respect to the opinions of mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the separation.

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, while evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future security. Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States.

We, therefore, the Representatives of the united States of America, in General Congress, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the world for the rectitude of our intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly publish and declare, That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be Free and Independent States; that they are Absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political connection between them and the State of Great Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as Free and Independent States, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which Independent States may of right do. And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm reliance on the protection of divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes and our sacred Honor.

The Signing of the United States Constitution occurred on September 17, 1787
