



TOP 10+1 LIST OF ACC VIOLATIONS

The FPOA encourages all residents to be aware of the Architectural Control Rules. Below is the short list of the more common violations that occur on The Farm and the page number of the Rule. *Questions concerning a home-improvement project? Please refer to the ACC Rules or call The ACC Administrative Assistant at The Barn office (951) 244-3719.*







- 4. Keep all trash cans out of view from the street when they are not out for trash day. Put out trash cans after 5:00 p.m. before trash day and put away before 9:00 a.m. the day following trash pick-up. Please use lattice or a plant to screen your trash cans from view if by the garage or in side yard. (Rule 6.4)
- 5. House numbers on curb faded? Our Maintenance Crew will paint them 33430 on the curb for **FREE**. Please call The Barn office (951) 244-3719 and provide your address. (Rule 4.2)
- 6. Store items out of view from the street, not on your carport, patio or driveway. (Rule 6.5)
- 7. Pole lights need to be lit from dusk 'til dawn, white bulb only, 40-to-75 watts. Check it regularly as they are the only source of light after dark. (Rule 4.4)
- 8. Holiday decorations can go up 30 days before a holiday.

 Please remove all decorations and lights 15 days after the holiday (Rule 4.1)
- 9. Re-paint your house, garage, trim, accents, *MAILBOXES*, fences, etc. when paint colors become faded and/or chipped. Planning to paint your home a different color? Obtain ACC approval first by submitting a Change Application and paint samples before buying the paint. (Rule 4.3)
- 10. A motorhome, trailer, boat, etc., can be stored on the driveway if it is 50 feet back from the street or screened from view. Otherwise, it can be parked in the FPOA RV Storage Lot for \$35.00/month. (Rule 7.6)



11. For all exterior changes to your property (e.g., fencing, roofing, solar panels, room additions, patios covers, etc.), **complete a Change Application for ACC approval** and obtain necessary City and/or State permits. (Fence Rule 5.6; Approval for Change Rule 3.2)

FEBRUARY GARDENING TIPS

It's February and for most people not a month you think about gardening, but February can be an important month for a successful garden. It's that time of the year to get the last of your cool weather pruning done before the warm weather arrives, and start the foundation for next cycle to be successful.

February is a good month to prune roses, perennials, and many ornamental grasses. Remove spent foliage from annuals and perennials. Mulching this time of year will help prevent weeds from the seasonal rains, saving back breaking work removing them later.

Check your herb garden for clumping, it's a good time of the year to divide overcrowded beads! This is also a good time to start a garden and help maintain some of the New Year's Resolutions from last month! New to Gardening and have questions or need help? Next Garden Committee meeting is March 18th!

WHAT CAN I RECYCLE?

From Waste Management

Through advances in recycling technology, you have more options than ever. And it's a good thing because we need to conserve as much of our resources as possible.

This month let's talk plastics. Did you know that every year we produce enough plastic film in this country to shrink-wrap Texas? Or that although Americans recycle more than 2.4 billion pounds of plastic each year, it only makes up around 27 percent of the waste stream? While plastic

offers the advantages of being flexible and lightweight, it also consumes fossil resources for its manufacture and contributes waste in our environment.

MAKE SURE IT'S CLEAN! - Does that plastic lunch container still have yesterday's pizza in it? Don't recycle it until it's clean! One dirty product, or one with food waste still in it, can contaminate an entire bale, containing thousands of pounds of collected plastics. This can cause thousands of recyclable items to go to a landfill instead of being recycled. **Cleanliness is essential.**

WHAT'S ACCEPTED? - Plastics come in a variety of shapes, colors and chemical formulations-all with different recycling needs. The code number does not mean the plastic can be recycled. It is simply a way to identify the resin, or plastic type. How can you tell what kinds of plastic to put into your recycling bin? The code number on the bottom of your product is not a reliable indicator of whether something can get recycled. Recycle by shape! Bottles, jars, and jugs-is the best way to know what is accepted.

LEARN ABOUT RECYCLING PLASTICS - Remember to keep dirty containers out of your recycling bin. One partially empty soda bottle in a bale of plastic can spoil the whole load. Plastic grocery and produce sacks are commonly placed in recycle bins. These bags can shut down an entire recycling plant and should be kept out of our recycling bin. Plastic bags are often collected in barrels at grocery stores, and usually end up as plastic lumber.

PET plastic is the most common material used for single-use bottled beverages, because it is inexpensive, lightweight, unbreakable and easy to recycle. It takes more than 1.5 million barrels of oil to produce a year's supply of water bottles. That's enough oil to fuel 100,000 cars for a year.

You must fill out an Architectural Change Application; this application can be picked up at The Farm office. All architectural change applications must be submitted to The Farm Office by Tuesday, February 5th or Friday, February 15th.

Responding to Violation Letters - Tips:



Tip 1: Understand why the rules exist

The Architectural Control Committee is in place to ensure that every homeowner's equity is protected. Not everyone has the same ideas about how a community should look or what type of conduct qualifies as "neighborly." By organizing these guidelines and formalizing them in our governing documents, The FPOA clearly outlines what will be expected from you and what you have the right to expect from your neighbors.

Tip 2: Ask why you received the notice

If you're caught off guard by a notice, then there's a chance you didn't know you were in violation of ACC rules. Contact the Architectural Control Administrator at The Farm office and ask for an explanation. Understanding where the ACC is coming from can help you contextualize the notice.

Tip 4: Understand that it is a progressive process

Just because you receive a violation notice doesn't mean you are automatically subject to a fine. The process looks like this: 2-week courtesy notice, notice of hearing with the FPOA Board (10-days to correct violation), and lastly a notice regarding the decision to fine for non-compliance. From the first notice to the last, the FPOA gives residents over 25 days to correct their violation; you will have ample time to ask questions, correct the problem and share your concerns with the board before facing a penalty.

Tip 5: The process is confidential and is not an attack on your character

Please do not assume that you are the only one on your street who received a violation letter. After every inspection, we receive complaints asking why a violation letter was sent to the person and not the "messy neighbors next door". Please know that the process is confidential, you will not receive status updates on your neighbor's compliance notices. Trust that the ACC is committed to impartiality; please know that due process is underway.

Tip 6: Familiarize yourself with FPOA Architectural Guidelines

Know what is contained in the Architectural Guidelines so you are aware of which compliance issues need to be absolved. Read the requirements, how they were violated, the fine schedule, and the remediation process.

Understanding the contents of The Farm rules and regulations makes it easier for the discussion to move forward.

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HISTORICAL GAZETTE ARTICLE 13

Nineteen-eighty seven was a year chucked full of all sorts of diverse events, some were of good benefit, others not so great, but they signified all the aspects one might expect if you were living in a "before its time" growing planned development. Compared to 1986, there just is no comparison.

The year began with the Board of Directors being shorthanded having suffered the resignation of the president, and the retirement of the financial advisor/corporate secretary at the end of 1986.

To this end and with some temporary replacements, the board was telling folks that this Association was getting too large too fast, and that it might be time to consider some outside help as well as getting more volunteers to help. To make ends meet, the board sold the Association's Kubota Tractor that the association was making \$259.00/monthly payments on. This action saved \$52,000.00 over the course of the coming year. Because of the snafu created in 1986 with the By-law passage and the CC&Rs vote not passing that caused the conflict between the two documents. Board president Gordon Cox and Board member Ed Corbett began a public relations campaign to educate the residency with the hope of getting a YEA vote to lower the 75% quorum to 50 + 1 in 1988 so changes to the CC&Rs would agree with the By-Laws.

By now there were 600 lot owners, so the board made three decisions with regard to management, First, because the maintenance committee had burned out, they hired Prestige Landscape Company to care for the common areas; second, in June, they hired Mr. Bob Johnson to fill the position they termed as "the Supervisor of Maintenance", (he held the job until September when he was replaced by Mr. Bud Sherman.) Also, they contemplated hiring an office manager. A part of the volunteer recruitment plan involved advertising in the Gazette for a volunteer to learn how to operate the Gazette Electronic Typewriter. As long as we are talking Gazette, the staff was also having problems with the increase in population. They were printing 48 to 52 pages; they needed some help and also needed more time to put things together. As a result they extended the 10-day deadline to 15 days. They had another problem where "letters to the editor" were becoming a little rough so they suspended the publication of them until they convinced the residents what good taste meant. The ACC was down three people and were overwhelmed with regular work plus complaints about the height of RV garages that were springing up around the community. The May 2nd Election was approaching, there were four candidate that had stepped up to fill unexpired terms and one other that was ending a term but re-running. The board sent out their annual reminder that you either pay up or you can't vote, words to the effect.

Curb painting began with the newly formed Emergency Disaster Committee, (I'll talk about them later) but was taken over by Crime Watch who finished the job by the end of the year. Speaking of Crime Watch, by September of this year Crime Watch had increased their number from 60 to 80 volunteers, but was still using the FPOA maintenance pickup truck to get around. The number 80

included drivers, observers and base station operators. The goal was to reach 180 members because they were doing two shifts per night and each volunteer was asked to do a shift twice per month.

Just so you know, besides setting up the Emergency Disaster Committee, the board instituted a Rules Compliance Committee to help the ACC with the new comers that were not used to Association Restrictions.

On November 3rd, the board became unhappy with their attorney; Hickey & Neuland and hired Rosin & Company, specifically Joyce Fleming as the new legal partner. The list of action continued, a new committee was the Garden Committee called the Plant Tenders. There was the regular house committee operated by Tina Miller at the helm, coffee at The Barn every morning and a Klatch every Friday. There was a Ceramics and Art Committee that eventually faded away due to costs of material. Tina was also involved in the Golf Committee. There was a Neighborhood Watch Committee in concert with the Crime Watch Committee.

The Welcoming Committee was working overtime in this year with the influx of 7 to 10 new-comers each month. Now, the Emergency Disaster Committee that was put in place as a stop gap in the event that we, who were out in the middle of nowhere, and who would become an island isolated from daily needs, (incidentally still true today); and it was seen that there was a need for self-sufficiency. To this end, the committee set to work making up a form and had it published in the Gazette. The form posed questions asked of the residents about what skills they could offer in the event of an emergency. The committee hoped to build a data base that would identify these skills among the members that could be of assistance when you could not get an electrician or a carpenter to do what you can't do for yourself. They had a shed down where the Crime Watch garage is today and had accumulated emergency supplies and a generator. A resident by the name of Bill McGill was the spearhead. Because of all this activity, someone finally figured out and asked where is the money. Again, to this end, the board proposed to raise the assessments to \$26.00 a month. Guess what, the board found out that they did not have the authority to raise the dues more than 5% at that time without a vote of the people, they put the question on the ballot, needed 411 YEA and only got 207 in favor, so they were forced to settle for \$21.40 How they ended up with the 40 cents beats me! Today the board, with good justification, can raise the assessment 20% without a vote of the Members.

Other firsts were two new handicap spaces at The Farm Barn. A builder came and proposed 1,200 homes to wrap around the South end of The Farm, I believe I remember, it was to be called Spring Valley as Amendment 4 to our specific plan, never went anywhere. The Community Center building fund of 1985 had \$10,817 in the bank after expenses. The Community Center construction fund was on its way to \$100,000 with each member being asked to donate \$300 to it. Try that one today!

The 10th Annual Farm Fair was a big deal in 1987. Mrs. Jackie Dyck eventually took on this project and led it to be a great event. Today, Jackie is still around in charge of Bunco.

Back in those days as well as today, it was seen that the needs of the teens were not the same as the needs of the parents, and that there should be something done to quell the energy of the young.

What's new! In September, we all were told that we would be getting new phone numbers; we were all in the 714 area code with 672, 674 and 679 prefixes. In October, we were still in the 714 area code but had new prefixes of 244 and in some cases 245 and 246. Since then, as you know, our area code is 951.

Back then we had our own private cable TV service called "King 3", 32 channels of various quality came from a big dish antenna and equipment building located between the water tank on the hill and the back part of the Farm Mutual Water Company. I have no more room, so I will tell you about a school issue, earthquakes and wild fire devastation next time. WOW!

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
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
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
