

#### Where do they come from?

Weed seeds that arrive in your yard can either be carried by the wind or by birds. They could be brought in with yard equipment, grass seed, organic soil amendments or "hitch" a ride on shoes, clothing or even on the fur of pets.

#### Weeds don't always look like weeds

The two basic groups of weeds are *grasses* and *broadleaf* weeds. Some sprout from seeds and grow, flower, produce seed and die within one season. These are referred to as *Annual* weeds. *Perennial* weeds can live for several years. The control methods you choose will depend on what type of weed you are dealing with.

#### Weed abatement tips:

**1. Prevention!** This is especially important for your lawn. Put down a pre-emergent herbicide that is safe for grass to prevent weeds for germinating in the first place.

2. Mulch! The more you mulch, the less you'll have to weed. A deep layer of mulch around plants will benefit your garden in several ways by discouraging weeds, conserving soil moisture, regulating soil temperature, and adding organic nutrients

**3. After it rains!** Yes, rain will speed up weed growth exponentially. But did you know it can serve as an advantage? With semi-moist soil, weed removal can be a much easier task as the soil is softer and less compacted giving weed roots less hold. Second Quarter Evaluations in April will be focused on painting, major and minor, in addition to all other non-compliances. If the paint on your home, garage, trim, fence, etc. has faded or is chipped, please touch it up (ACC Rule Section 4.3).

## TOP 10+1 LIST OF ACC VIOLATIONS

The FPOA encourages all residents to be aware of the Architectural Control Rules. Below is the short list of the more common violations that occur on The Farm and the page number of the Rule. *Questions concerning a home-improvement project? Please refer to the ACC Rules or call The ACC Administrative Assistant at The Barn office (951) 244-3719.* 

- 1. No motor vehicles , RV's, etc. shall be permitted to be parked or stored on any front yard even if it is covered with rock, gravel, or decomposed granite ("DG"). (Rule 7.7)
- 2. Screen your air conditioner or swamp cooler if it can be seen from the street. (Rule 5.3)
- 3. Keep your yards weed free. (Rule 6.1)
- 4. Keep all trash cans out of view from the street when they are not out for trash day. Put out trash cans after 5:00 p.m. before trash day and put away before 9:00 a.m. the day following trash pick-up. Please use lattice or a plant to screen your trash cans from view if by the garage or in side yard. (Rule 6.4)
- 5. House numbers on curb faded? Our Maintenance Crew will paint them 33430 on the curb for **FREE**. Please call The Barn office (951) 244-3719 and provide your address. (Rule 4.2)
- 6. Store items out of view from the street, not on your carport, patio or driveway. (Rule 6.5)
- 7. Pole lights a need to be lit from dusk 'til dawn, white bulb only, 40-to-75 watts. Check it regularly as they are the only source of light after dark. (Rule 4.4)
- 8. Holiday decorations can go up 30 days before a holiday. Please remove all decorations and lights 15 days after the holiday (Rule 4.1)
  - Phase -
- 9. Re-paint your house, garage, trim, accents, *MAILBOXES*, fences, etc. when paint colors become faded and/or chipped. Planning to paint your home a different color? Obtain ACC approval first by submitting a Change Application and paint samples before buying the paint. (Rule 4.3)
- 10. A motorhome, trailer, boat, etc., can be stored on the driveway if it is *50 feet back from the street* or *screened from view*. Otherwise, it can be parked in the FPOA RV Storage Lot for \$35.00/month. (Rule 7.6)



11. For all exterior changes to your property (e.g., fencing, **formation** roofing, solar panels, room additions, patios covers, etc.), **complete a Change Application for ACC approval** and obtain necessary City and/or State permits. (Fence Rule 5.6; Approval for Change Rule 3.2)

#### HISTORICAL GAZETTE ARTICLE #14 By George Taylor

Let me begin this article by finishing off 1987, as I said last time. First, there was the Jean Hayman School issue. Skylark Airport was proposing a runway that would allow takeoffs and landings directly over the school. Many Farm and other residents had children in Jean Hayman School. Although the construction for this school began in 1965, it still needed to be upgraded and completed, to whit, the School District was withholding \$1,400,000 because of this problem. Ultimately, Caltrans stepped in and resolved the problem by changing the permitted flight pattern to NW/ SE. Problem solved, the district released the funds and the parents were happy.

The second item was an earthquake that really shook us on October 1, 1987, followed by a wildfire on October 7, 87, that consumed the entire ridgeline to our west and that came down to the backyards of those folks who resided on Olive Grove. Fortunately, there were still many vacant lots and no trees around here at that time, but both events sent a personal message to the newly formed Emergency Disaster Committee. One hundred and fifty-six residents responded to the disaster questions published in the Gazette. We had the police, and the fire department running up and down The Farm Road with air tankers dropping fire retardant, and bulldozers cutting fire lanes in the mountains in efforts to douse the flames and stop the spread. We were all packed and ready to go, but they were able to get it out by the next morning without further incident.

Nineteen eighty-eight began with the usual trials and tribulations of the growing community with a CC&R uneducated residency, the majority of which have never lived where there were restrictions put on them.

The population of this community continued to average between seven and ten new residents each month throughout the year. Because of the influx of both retired and the affordable housing market all over Riverside County, the County proposed a slow growth initiative and our residents were being warned by local real-estate folks not to sign any petition that would get the initiative on the ballot for the June 1988 election. Many residents had bought lots, but were not living here yet and if this initiative passed it might curtail their plans to put a home on their lot when they needed to do so. In this year, the monthly assessment was raised from \$21.40 to \$22.47. As you might guess when you come from Orange County or Los Angeles to the "Sticks" one's social lifestyle becomes somewhat impaired and so it was with the early residents here. Fortunately, we found Delaney's, my favorite place, in Temecula. There was Deborah's in Homeland, and the Black Sea Restaurant at Four Corners. All of which have long since gone by the wayside.

# The Garden Plot

#### March Reminders

#### <u>Maintenance</u>

- Prune grapes and roses.
- Cleanup: remove mummy fruit and blighted limbs on stone fruit to reduce brown rot. Remove and destroy fallen leaves to reduce peach leaf curl.
- Mulch cane berries, cut out all old canes and reset new canes in twine.
- Cultivate and pull weeds now!
- If weather permits, prepare beds for planting by spading in compost and soil amendments.
- Check irrigation system and perform maintenance as needed.
- Divide and replant herbs.

#### <u>Fertilize</u>

- Cane berries, strawberries.
- Deciduous fruit and young shade trees at first sign of leaves, young conifers, cool season grass and roses.
- Kiwis (give 2/3 of recommended annual PNK, 1/3 in May).
- Citrus are heavy nitrogen feeders. Mature trees need 1 ½ lbs. N per year. Divide this amount by 4 and apply each quarter 1 month apart for 4 months, beginning in March.
- Daphne and camellia with NPK bloom.
- All shrubs except newly planted. Wait until after bloom for azaleas and rhododendrons.

#### What to plant for March

- Container roses, shrubs and trees.
- Grapes, cane berries, rhubarb.
- Canterbury Bells, Forget-Me-Nots, Foxglove, Pansies, Primula and other available perennials.
- From seed : radish, lettuce, chard, snap beans.
- Indoor Starting: Hardy annuals from seed such as delphinium, nemesia, matthiola, eggplant, peppers, tomatoes, all melons and squash family.

Hurry! Get your own Garden plot! For a \$20.00 key deposit you can have your own 4 ft by 10 ft garden plot with free water! Only<u>3</u>Left!

#### Organic Cupboard:

Pests getting the best of your garden? Mix up a garlic and onion spray! Grind up raw onions and garlic into a puree. Soak in warm water overnight and strain. Liquid can be sprayed on roses, fruit trees, and flowers. Great use for those onions and garlic that may have been in your cupboard a bit to long.... Need more help with your garden? 

#### CONSTITUTION CORNER

Does the Constitution authorize a wall on the southern border? An invasion is a military offensive in which large parts of combatants of one geopolitical entity aggressively enter territory controlled by another such entity, generally with the objective of either conquering; liberating or re-establishing control or authority over a territory...
