COMMITTEE REPORTS

ACC Committee

Eileen San Giovanni reported for the ACC Committee. The February House of the Month certificate and photo were shared. The Proud family was unable to attend. The March House of the Month certificate and photo were presented to the Suchand family. Eileen read the resignation letter from the Bradley family.

Coffee Klatsch

Cliff Vosburg reported for Coffee Klatsch. Coffee Klatsch is doing really good. Residents are coming for treats. We meet the first Monday of every month at 9:15 a.m. at the Farm Barn.

Community Garden

Beth Kramer reported for the Garden Committee. At our January meeting, we discussed and planned for this year's crops; tomatoes, onions, and bell peppers for the chili cook-off, pumpkins for the kids, an herb garden with cilantro and green onion, and a flower garden with sun flowers and holy hocks to attract local bees and decorations for the yearly events.

We discussed revamping the garden committee's Gazette articles. "The Garden Plot" was debuted in the March Gazette. We planned a cleaning day on February 9th but the weather had other ideas. Eileen and myself spent some time Friday, February 8th cleaning the herb garden. Maintenance, thank you for helping us with the big beds. They did a wonderful job of cleaning the remnants of last year's crops and the weeds between them. We had an anonymous donor drop off a nice load of paver stones and bricks towards our walkway project. We want to send a big thank you.

It's a great start towards the project and we need more if anyone has any project leftovers. We voted on moving forward with the Eagle Scout project. Eileen met with Scout Masters Mr. Ken Kendric and Mr. Bob Cicero (Farm resident) on March 10th. They expressed enthusiasm and confidence that this would be a good Eagle Scout project and would forward it to Troop 304's meeting on March 11th.

We have a guest speaker coming on Saturday, April 27th at the Farm Barn from Riverside County Department of Waste Management to talk about composting. They will discuss the composting process from start to finish. They will also discuss how you can make a small composting bin at home and how to manage it. These are things we don't need to send to the landfills. Even if you don't "garden" compost is useful in your yard. Our next meeting is on Monday, March 18th.

Crime Watch Committee

Ingrid Goode reported for Crime Watch. We had 17 patrols with 219 miles for the month of December. We had 18 patrols with 317 miles for the month of January. The financials were reviewed and approved. Crime Watch is still in need of members and patrols. An increase in negative activity in the neighborhood was discussed. If you or anyone you know has been victimized, please call and report it no matter how minor it may be as this will keep our deputies aware of the need for patrols in our area.

Moment of silence was given for Crime Watch member David Goode who passed on January 10th.

Crime Watch welcomed new members Glenda and Manny Santos and Roger Kramer. We discussed much-needed equipment such as emergency flashlights with cones and batteries, traffic signs, a mag light, fire extinguisher(s) and a first aid kit were motioned, voted on, and approved for purchase.

FERT Committee

Dean Gray reported for the FERT Committee. In the combined areas of operations, logistics, planning and administrative, the following are approximate numbers to date. With focus on the following critical areas: Administrative Team-Leadership currently operating at approximately 80%, down 20% with the loss of Brian Hasselbach-Search and Rescue, and David Goode-FERT Security. Block captains currently operating at approximately 20%, up 5% with the addition of two block captains; Medical Supplies currently operating at approximately 15%, up 5%; Search and Rescue equipment at approximately 10%, up 5%; Security equipment at approximately 20%, up 10%; and food storage at approximately 10%, up 5% with donation.

The FERT Operations Building is fully operational with the new generator in place, communications are running at approximately 95% with no change. These numbers are based on approximate residents of the community, and the number of residents not prepared, based on surveys taken at all our recruiting events; approximately 3,000 residents with one-third needing some form of assistance. The FERT Team assisted Crime Watch with the traffic problem for the second time when Bundy Canyon was briefly shut down and vehicles were diverted through the Farm in late January. We have also placed a food donation box where residents can donate non-perishable, non-expired dry goods that will be stored with the FERT center annually, at which time the food will then be distributed to Farm residents in need at the holidays.

The Blood Drive conducted in January resulted in 35 pints being gathered, bringing in approximately \$350 to the FERT Team from LifeStream. The next Blood Drive is scheduled for Saturday, April 13th at Millers' Mill.

Recreation Committee

Eileen San Giovanni reported for the Recreation Committee. Mardi Gras dinner event was a huge success. Great food, fun residents and an awesome 7-piece band that was donated by Jan Mackenzie!! Thank you to Jan and the talented musicians.

Our St. Patrick Day dinner event is on Saturday, March 16th. You can sign up on the waiting list if you didn't get on the main list. This is one of the resident's favorite. We are so looking forward not only the delicious dinner but the live entertainment following our meal.

April's event is called "Crazy Hats Day". And do we get some crazy hats! The menu for that is by popular demand with spaghetti & meatballs, salad, garlic bread, and pistachio pudding. Still, at our low price of \$6 donation and children under 8 eat free.

Welcome Committee

Gerrit Brands reported for Durene Southward. This month the Welcome Committee went out on February 9th with Durene Southward, Mary Heitz, and Dena Vogstrom. For the month of February, there were four new residents to welcome to the Farm. We talked with three of the new residents. It's always wonderful to hear the stories about how

they found the Farm. This month it was friends who have lived here and they fell in love when they came to visit, and others looking for a quiet community with friendly neighbors. The Welcome Committee is looking forward to meeting new neighbors next month.

Youth Committee

Susie Watters reported for the Youth Committee. <u>Past Events:</u> Fun Run and Pancake Breakfast – We had around 40 kids participate in our Fun Run. They were so cute, and mastering each task and running to the next! They all received a participation trophy. We want to thank our numerous volunteers for stepping up to help when we needed you! We also had a Pancake Breakfast that morning. We were so pleased to see so many members of our community (kids and kids at heart) enjoy the breakfast and socialize. We served about 70 breakfasts. Thanks to all who came out to support our event.

<u>Valentine's Party and Dance</u> – Approximately 45 kids attended our party. Our DJ was fabulous and the kids loved him. We had dinner and dessert. They had fun dressing up for the photo booth and playing games. Every kid received a Valentine's goodie bag and they all had a great time.

The first evaluation of the year is complete, leaving 96% of properties in compliance with Architectural Rules. 489 courtesy notices were sent out. Of those, 253 corrected the problems within the 2 week timeline. 136 homeowners received a final notice and 90 corrected within 10 days. 46 did not comply and received fines. The second quarterly inspection will begin in April. Garrett is the ACC Administrative Assistant and can be reached at the Farm Barn. The rest of the ACC committee consists of volunteers who help ensure that our community looks beautiful and that our property values are maintained. We have two longtime ACC members who will be leaving and we thank them so much for their time serving in the Farm. We are looking for 2 new ACC members to volunteer. If interested, please see the ad in the Gazette for more info.

The Youth Committee continues to work hard to bring fun family-friendly events to our community. The committee is made up of a small group of volunteers who would love to have more helpers. You do not have to be a homeowner to volunteer on a committee. Renters are welcome! We meet next Thursday at 6:30 p.m. in the Farm Barn. We are also providing community service opportunities for teenagers who need hours for school.

Architectural Control Committee Message:

Any architectural changes or improvements to the exterior of your property require approval from the ACC before work can be initiated. You must fill out an Architectural Change Application; this application can be picked up at The Farm office. All architectural change applications must be submitted to The Farm

Office by Friday, May 10th.

2-Week violation notices have been sent to all residents in violation of ACC rules. Please correct all violations assessed to the property by May 12, 2019 to avoid possible fines.

The ACC Committee has gone out to perform our second Evaluation of the year. The main violations we focused on were the painting of homes, garages, trim, and fascia boards. We also checked for A/C units, evaporative coolers, trash cans needing to be screened from street view.

<u>Responding to ACC violation letters</u>

Tip 1: Understand why the rules exist

The Architectural Control Committee is in place to ensure that every homeowner's equity is protected. Not everyone has the same ideas about how a community should look or what type of conduct qualifies as "neighborly." By organizing these guidelines and formalizing them in our governing documents, The FPOA clearly outlines what will be expected from you and what you have the right to expect from your neighbors.

Tip 2: Ask why you received the notice

If you're caught off guard by a notice, then there's a chance you didn't know you were in violation of ACC rules. Contact the Architectural Control Administrator at The Farm office and ask for an explanation. Understanding where the ACC is coming from can help you contextualize the notice.

Tip 3: Understand that it is a progressive process

Just because you receive a violation notice doesn't mean you are automatically subject to a fine. The process looks like this: 2-week courtesy notice, notice of hearing with the FPOA Board (10-days to correct violation), and lastly a notice regarding the decision to fine for non-compliance. From the first notice to the last, the FPOA gives residents over 25 days to correct their violation; you will have ample time to ask questions, correct the problem and share your concerns with the board before facing a penalty.

Tip 4: The process is not an attack on your character.

Please do not assume that you are the only one on your street who received a violation letter. After every inspection, we receive complaints asking why a violation letter was sent to the person and not the "messy neighbors next door". Please know that the process is confidential, you will not receive status updates on your neighbor's compliance notices. Trust that the ACC is committed to impartiality; please know that due process is underway.

Tip 5: Familiarize yourself with FPOA Architectural Guidelines

Know what is contained in the Architectural Guidelines so you are aware of which compliance issues need to be absolved. Read the requirements, how they were violated, the fine schedule, and the remediation process.

Understanding the contents of The Farm rules and regulations makes it easier for the discussion to move forward.



Water Saving Lawn and Garden Tips:

- Irrigate at night: Watering your lawn at night or during the early morning hours can reduce evaporation up to 30 percent or more, depending on your location.
- Avoid High Wind Watering: High winds can evaporate water or blow it away from the target zone; this causes waste water and lowers your sprinkler's efficiency.
- **Don't Over water Your Lawn:** Your yard only needs about an inch of water per week to stay healthy, established gardens require a little less. Watering infrequently but deeply will inhibit a deep root growth, keeping your lawn viable for years to come. Over watering has been linked to pesticide and fertilizers being introduced into streams and rivers so avoidance is the best practice all around.
- Use Rain Barrels: Capture the naturally occurring rain and store it for use in your garden or yard. Many systems can be hooked right up to your sprinklers using solar or traditional powered pumps.
- **Don't Water the Street:** Thousands of gallons of water are wasted each day in neighborhoods and homes that have improperly setup sprinkler heads. The street and sidewalk don't need watering, take special care to make sure your sprinkler heads and hoses put the water where it is really needed.



HISTORICAL GAZETTE ARTICLE 15 By George Taylor

The past 14 articles that I have given to you represented the early years of The Farm. They have shown to have been collections of a cohesive and closely knitted community over the years that I have portrayed it to be. Was it all a bowl of cherries, No! It had its moments but still survives.

In this year, there was a turning point mainly due to the lack of good board communication experience and the lack of knowledge of individuals who came here not having been subjected to Association Law, Covenants Conditions and Restrictions, that all of a sudden were thrust upon them.

The elected Board of Directors in 1989 were President William Walters, a retiree with 26 years administrative experience, Lily Carson vice president retired accounting professional, Mr. Joy Leveau retired Para-Legal, and Accounts Manager, Marie Taylor Treasurer, experience in banking and a degree in Business, Mr. Ed Stiverson a director, retired Executive Director and General Manager California Association of Professional Employees, Ray Gilore retired Allied Equipment Tractor Corporation, and last was Mr. Ed Daehn Maintenance Engineer and Automotive Business owner.

I would say, a very knowledgeable group to represent us. (Incidentally, these were the folks who won an appeal that got us the funding to build Millers' Mill).

Why am I telling you all of this personal information about these folks! Reason being that later on in the year it came budget time, and after much consideration about how are we going to keep the Association solvent, they consulted the law and found that there was a path to avoid what appeared to be looming in the coming future.

Well, they found that with proper justification, this board would be able to raise the assessment by 20 percent without voter approval. Well again, remember, as I had previously mentioned, there was the Concerned Property Owners group. This group said "Wait a Minute" are you crazy, (Words to that effect) we gave no permission to increase our assessment by that rate.

On the surface it appeared to be an abuse of board power, so the CPO put out a petition to recall the entire board of directors saying the this increase was unwarranted.

The demand: the assessment remain the same with no increase. They got their percentage of signatures and presented it for review to the Board of Directors. The board found it to be a valid document, I.E. No duplicate signatures, and all were found members in good standing.

The board called a special meeting, held it on the tennis court and exercised the recall, but when the new board was seated and went to work in their assigned positions, they found that it took the 20 percent increase to pay the bills and had to honor the increase.

If those recall folks were around today, I would tell them that the moral of this story is: You can't really know a job until you occupy the position, so be careful for what you wish for, you may cause more harm than it was worth.

Beyond this significant event that polarized The Farm community for many years, but the various clubs and committees continued to do their thing and we are all still here today. As I said above, these articles that I have written represent the early years of this community and the people that volunteered to keep property values up and the community growing. To all of them and to all of those presently who are continuing that work, I say Bless you, and thanks for what you do for all of us.



WEST NILE VIRUS PREVENTION By Steve Freed

Attention ALL Farm Residents! As you have probably read in the paper or seen in the news, mosquitoes that carry West Nile Virus have reached epidemic proportions in Riverside County. Also, the arrival of nonnative mosquitoes that carry Yellow Fever was discovered a while back.

There are ways to avoid mosquito bites that have been frequently recommended in the news, including wearing long pants and long sleeves when outside, using mosquito repellent containing DEET, and avoiding being outside at dusk or dawn when mosquitoes are most active. These are all good ideas.

However, the best way to deal with disease carrying mosquitoes is to prevent them from breeding in the first place. Mosquitoes can breed in as little as a discarded bottle cap full of water!

Farm residents! We strongly request that you check your yards for anything that may catch and hold standing water. We ask that you do this frequently and regularly, especially after watering or after a rain.

Look for buckets; open coolers; cans; plant pots; trash cans; pools; bird baths; old tires; anything that can hold even a small amount of standing water. Dump them and discard them, bring them inside or turn them so they won't collect water. Remember, even something as small as a bottle cap full of water can breed mosquitoes.

The frequent rains this winter and spring will create a lot of potential standing water, but being vigilant concerning standing water should be a year around project.

Remember also that mosquitoes don't respect fence lines. You following these simple guidelines regularly, now and in the future, will not only protect you and your family but it will also protect your neighbors as well.

Be a good neighbor. Let's all work together and keep our community a safe place to live.

CONSTITUTION ARTICLE

By Ed Mitchell (Continued from last month)

Part two: A convention to propose amendments to the United States Constitution Eight state constitutions in effect at the time of the 1787 Constitutional Convention convened in Philadelphia included an amendment mechanism. Amendment-making power rested with the legislature in three of the states and in the other five it was given to specially elected conventions. The Articles of Confederation provided that amendments were to be proposed by Congress and ratified by the unanimous vote of all thirteen state legislatures. This proved to be a major flaw in the Articles, as it created an insurmountable obstacle to constitutional reform.

One of the main reasons for the 1787 Convention was that the Articles of Confederation required the unanimous consent of all 13 states for the national government to take action. This system had proved unworkable, and the newly written Constitution sought to address this problem.

The first proposal for a method of amending the Constitution offered in the Constitutional Convention, contained in the Virginia Plan, sought to circumvent the national legislature, stating that "the assent of the National Legislature ought not to be required.

A frequent question is whether applications from the states can omit to mention subject matter, and instead request an unlimited convention. Past practice suggests that separate unlimited applications submitted to Congress at different times are not allowed. Article V itself calls for "the application of the legislatures" instead of calling for plural "applications".

According to James Kenneth Rogers, the drafting

history of Article V indicates that states may limit the subject matter of their applications, and that Congress has a duty to tally applications separately by subject matter. Moreover, Rogers asserts that states may not make a general application without specifying the subject or subjects to be addressed by the convention. Rogers points out that, during the drafting process, the Philadelphia Convention at one point adopted a version of Article V that gave power to Congress to propose amendments when two-thirds of both houses agreed, or to propose amendments without a congressional supermajority "on the application of two thirds of the Legislatures of the several states." This draft version of Article V lacked any provision for a constitutional convention requested by the states, and instead included language almost identical to the final version of Article V but giving states the power to apply to Congress for amendments without any convention. The draft language suggests that states applying to Congress for amendments would have to say what sort of amendments they were applying for, because a general petition (that is, one not limited by subject matter) asking Congress to propose amendments would serve little purpose "beyond notifying Congress that two-thirds of the States thought that some unknown changes to the Constitution were desirable." Therefore, due to the similarity between the draft and final versions, Rogers contends that state applications to Congress must specify subject matter, and must be tallied individually by subject matter to determine whether the two-thirds threshold of state applications has been met.



When ne'er-do-wells come into our area with decided mischief and larceny on their minds, the Crime Watch car and the members manning it, have a definite impact on their thought processes. More volunteers mean more patrols and more coverage of our neighborhood; give a couple of hours a week or month, whatever time you can spare - make a difference in <u>YOUR</u> community.

Every 2nd Saturday we have an Informational Meeting at 9:00 a.m. at the Farm Barn, coffee and donuts are served; and our **Committee**

Regular meeting is the 4^{th} Monday of every month at 7:00 p.m. at Millers Mill. Come and join us and see what is happening in your community or update us with information you might have.

WHAT IS CRIME WATCH? By Cathy Neubauer, Crime Watch Liaison

Crime Watch is simply a program of neighbors volunteering their time to watch out for our community during weekdays, evenings and weekends. The purpose of the Crime Watch program is to create an alert neighborhood by using simple crime prevention methods. It takes as little time as two hours per month. The program works throughout the mutual aid of neighbors watching the property of other neighbors and common areas. A police officer driving by your home might not recognize someone as a stranger in your yard. However, an alert Crime Watch Volunteer would recognize the person as a stranger and could dial 9-1-1. Volunteers are never asked to put themselves in harm's way to prevent crime. *They should only observe and report suspicious activities to the Police Department.*

There are advantages to the program, neighbors recognize the Crime Watch Car and that you are helping the Neighborhood as well as they can come to you with their concerns. Volunteering builds bonds with neighbors. People look out for one another and this stimulates neighborhood awareness. Reduces the risk of becoming a crime victim and in turn reduces the physical, financial and psychological costs of crime.

Residents are the "eyes and ears" of the community. Crime Watch focuses on the individuals of the neighborhood. Crime Watch can be a very effective program, but it depends upon the residents of The Farm, whether you are owners or renters to maintain the program and make it work. Crime Watch cannot work without resident volunteers.

Benefits of The Farm Crime Watch are obvious:

- Crime Prevention
- Better quality of life
- Greater sense of security, responsibility and personal control
- Builds community pride
- Preparing for helping ourselves and others in our community
- Provide law enforcement agencies with volunteer support year round

Residents become the extra "eyes and ears" of law enforcement personnel and therefore reduce law enforcements burdens The Farm Crime Watch is neighbors helping neighbors ... building bonds with neighbors

Everyone wants Crime Watch to succeed. Crime is everyone's business and help is out there, but we are having trouble finding you. Neighbors are our only source of volunteers. Often neighbors will sit back and assume that someone else will volunteer, or they may not be as qualified to help other neighbors. All neighbors are welcome to volunteer at least once in some capacity, two hours a week ... two hours a month ... whatever time you have. You can volunteer your skills by patrolling, typing, computer, design, public speaking, organizational skills, speakers, ideas, and fundraisers, to name a few.

As a Crime Watch Volunteer you become more alert and aware of what is going on in your neighborhood. You also:

- Get to know your neighbors
- Be observant and watch over neighbors' homes, especially when they are not home or out of town.
- Write down license plate numbers and descriptions of suspicious looking vehicles and or good descriptions of any suspicious persons. Immediately report them to 911 or the sheriff nonemergency number
- Report information to your Crime Watch Chairperson.
- Educate children in crime prevention and teach respect for law enforcement officers.

Come and join us at our Next Meeting on May 20th, 7:00 p.m. at Millers' Mill or attend our next Speaker Event on May 11th, 9:00 a.m. at the Farm Barn. Guest Speaker Scott from Old Town Temecula Survival Store, who will be speaking on sheltering in place. 2019 has seen a lot of rain which brings a lot of growth in the surrounding hills, please be prepared.

Sunday - Men's group, 8:00 am - 10:00 am


